

Alpine Plants Care Guide

Alpine Plants Collection consists of specially selected miniature and dwarf conifers, Japanese maples, and alpine companion plants designed for container gardening, rock gardens, and small troughs. Because these premium, slow-growing plants are usually grown in small 4-inch pots or combined into pre-arranged planters, they require precise moisture management and protection compared to standard landscape trees.

Container & Soil Requirements

🌿 **Excellent Drainage:** Ensure your pot, trough, or container has adequate drainage holes. Standing water will quickly cause root rot in these miniature varieties.

🌿 **Potting Mix:** Use a high-quality, lightweight, well-draining potting soil. Mixing in coarse sand or perlite can significantly improve drainage for alpine or conifer varieties.

🌿 **Root Prep:** When transplanting out of the small "Fancy 4" grower pot, gently loosen the outer roots. If it is tightly root-bound, make light vertical cuts along the sides and bottom of the root ball to encourage outward growth.

Light & Watering Care

☀️ **Controlled Sun Exposure:** Most dwarf conifers in this collection thrive in full sun to partial shade, while delicate Japanese maples or specific alpine companion plants prefer protection from intense, scorching afternoon sun.

💧 **The "Touch Test" for Water:** Small containers dry out rapidly. Water deeply whenever the top inch of soil feels dry. Soak the container until water runs out of the bottom holes, but never let the pot sit directly in a water-filled saucer.

❄️ **Winter Protection:** Because container soil freezes completely through much faster than the ground, pots kept outdoors in freezing climates need protection. Wrap the containers in burlap, mulch them heavily, or move them to an unheated garage or protected patio for the winter.

Pruning & Maintenance

✂️ **No Heavy Pruning Needed:** These plants are selected specifically for their naturally tight, compact, and extremely slow growth habits. Pruning is rarely necessary unless you are removing dead twigs or intentionally training them for bonsai shapes.

🌿 **Minimal Fertilizer:** Apply a very diluted, slow-release, balanced fertilizer once in the early spring. Over-fertilizing miniature plants can cause them to lose their compact shape or burn their confined root systems.
